Accents looks differently at space, to maximise value for stakeholders, businesses and communities, existing and new.

BALFRON SEASON

2014 saw a summer of culture in Balfron Tower, opening Erno Goldfinger's iconic masterpiece to the public. The season included RIFT's celebrated production of Macbeth, Bow Arts' London Festival of Architecture projects and the National Trust's popup flat designed by Wayne and Tilly Hemingway. 3,500 visitors came to the events, which garnered £1.2m in positive publicity.



SOLAR PANELS

Over the last 5 years our solar panels programme has seen the installation of 6,688 panels across Poplar. £36,000 in energy savings for residents have been realised to date, and the programme will generate £2m income over the next 20 years, ringfenced specifically for community investment and reducing carbon emissions.



OPEN POPLAR

Award-winning initiative launched in 2015, turning liability space into assets. The first two rounds generated over 200 proposals with 35,500sqm of ideas, £430,000 investment and £67,000 in annual rent, rising each year. Spaces transformed include affordable studios from a firedamaged basement, the UK's first Haitian coffee shop and numerous meanwhile activities.

An area's people are its key asset

Accents supports a range of local groups, projects and networks to help grow their capacity and take ever stronger roles in shaping their communities.



POPLAR PEDDLERS

Uniting road-cycling middle-aged men in lycra, young people on BMXs, Bangladeshi mums and people learning to ride a bike, Poplar Peddlers is truly inclusive. The group was established in 2015 with regular group rides and cycling training. 2018 saw a new BMX track at Langdon Park, delivered in partnership with Access Sport.



R-URBAN

R-Urban, operated by Public Works architecture and art collective, offers a unique programme of workshops, events, discussions and summer schools. Focussing on urban sustainability and citizenled technology, local people come together through sharing food and learning new skills. The site has a classroom, community kitchen, microanaerobic digester, tool library and raised growing spaces, making use of a former carpark.

THE TOMMY FLOWERS

The Tommy Flowers, East London's first community pub, was set up in partnership with Aberfeldy Big Local and local artist collective Fitzrovia Noir. Tea room and art gallery by day, pub by night, it has become a much-loved social hub for the whole community, long-term and new residents alike.

Strong local enterprise is a vital element of building self-sustaining, inclusive communities

CHRISP STREET EXCHANGE

This intervention in the regeneration of Poplar's district centre improved enterprise space, supported business growth and amplified local voice. Mayor of London investment saw 1,028sqm improved commercial space, upgraded shop fronts, and 300 businesses supported. The Pop Up Business School and a microloans programme offered enterprise support, while the Poplar & Bow Enterprise Network provided a B2B platform for trade and networking.



ARBEIT E14

Through our Open Poplar programme, creative workspace provider Arbeit converted a fire-damaged basement underneath flats in the Lansbury estate into 12 affordable studios. Local tenants include creative practitioners across digital production, graphic design and visual arts. Startups work alongside more established small businesses and all can take advantage of a shared gallery space on the site.

Our co-working and enterprise support hub launched in 2016. Funded by the Mayor of London's High Streets Fund, the hub is run by Launch 22 and offers affordable desks and meeting space to a range of local businesses. Accompanying business growth programmes include incubation, mentoring in a range of enterprise essentials and regular networking and hackathon events.

AIR QUALITY

Air pollution is a major concern across London. Accents' partnership with the London Borough of Tower Hamlets, University of East London and climate change groups is delivering a programme of behavioural change activities, community events, schools programmes and targeted local interventions. A masterplan, 'A12: Green Mile', has been developed detailing potential green infrastructure interventions, with the first stages currently being implemented





ANGELA LANSBURY FILM FESTIVAL

2014 was a homecoming for Dame Angela Lansbury, grand-daughter of politician, social reformer and local hero, George Lansbury. Personally selected screenings of seven of her most iconic movies delighted residents old and young, with Chrisp Street Market transformed into an outdoor cinema for the event. The festival was brought about through Accents' partnership with the George Lansbury Memorial Committee, and garnered £1.2m in positive publicity.



LANSBURY MICRO MUSEUM

Since opening in 2016, the V&A's Lansbury Micro Museum has attracted 3,603 visitors through its evolving exhibitions, exploring the story of this part of East London. It re-illuminates the area, bringing new visitors and broadening understanding of Poplar's Festival of Britain heritage. The museum is run by local volunteers and curated by the V&A, ahead of its move to Eastbank in 2022.

SWING EAST

2019 saw Estates Team Leader Nelson Piperides' sixth Swing East, the festival which celebrates the best of swing music, dance and vintage markets, in its 1951 Chrisp Street home. Over 4,000 people come each year to dance to the hottest bands, and eat and drink from local food stalls. Christmas and Valentine events and regular swing dance classes have also been a hit.



WOMEN EAST

Inspired by the suffrage centenary, Personal Assistant Nicola Rushton started Women East in Stroudley Walk, Bow, where Sylvia Pankhurst gave her first speech on the back of a cart. Now looking to the next 100 years, Women East empowers women and girls through arts and politics, providing a platform for all the diverse voices of East London's women to shape their futures.

POPLAR SINGERS

Deputy Communications Manager Hannah Douse started Poplar Singers in January 2016 and it was an immediate hit, attracting members from 18-85 years old. The community choir's first public outing was the stunning De:Part performance with LIFT and Spitalfields Music and they recently played the Barbican as part of Sky Art's OpenFest: Art 50. Now a fully-fledged independent organisation, Poplar Singers perform regularly at events across London.



BRINGING IT ALL **TOGETHER**

Re-seeding a fashion industry in East London

Leaside Fashion and Creative Cluster is a sector-leading ambition to return design and manufacturing to the Lower Lea, delivering permanent jobs and affordable workspace for a mixed and ambitious community.

The first phase, Poplar Works, converted redundant garages alongside the A12 into a multi-faceted fashion workspace, adjacent to large scale residential development sites.



Conceived and developed by Accents, in partnership with London College of Fashion, UAL, creative workspace provider The Trampery, and the GLA, this £6m scheme is part-funded by the Mayor of London and Poplar HARCA.

Combining low cost studios, training, garment production and a café and events space, it will support 170 businesses, create 85 local jobs and 185 training and apprenticeship opportunities in its first two years.

Poplar Works is just the first step in seeding a burgeoning industry in the Lower Lea as it undergoes seismic physical and demographic change. Local regeneration and fashion sector growth contexts hold an opportunity to build a sizeable cluster of inter-related fashion and creative workspace in Poplar and beyond.

Residential-led schemes, often on brownfield sites, will deliver

considerable commercial space in the next decade. London's policy strategies are focusing on the huge undersupply of fashion and creative workspace and production facilities in East London. Utilising loan financing, increased land values and new revenue streams, there is an opportunity to secure and curate a financially self-sufficient cluster that benefits residents, developers and the local authority alike. A potential 40,000sqm cluster is deliverable over the next decade - supporting 650 businesses and creating 3.500 jobs.

This re-seeds an industry which will deliver social, economic and cultural regeneration, and forge a strong, saleable area identity. Ultimately producing a sustainably accessible, authentic and ambitious place for the benefit of East London's community, current and future.
